



Stories of the Spirit of Justice by Jemar Tisby


Resistance stories from Black history for kids : inspiring people and events that every kid should know by Rann Miller

Resistance Stories from Black History for Kids sets out to show that the Black experience is not only defined by marching and boycotting, but also through rebellion and resistance.




A song for the unsung : Bayard Rustin, the man behind the 1963 March on Washington by Carole Boston Weatherford

Every movement has its unsung heroes: individuals who work in the background without praise or accolades. One such hero of the Civil Rights Movement was Bayard Rustin.




Martin Luther King Jr. : walking in the light by Jon M. Fishman


Justice rising : 12 amazing Black women in the Civil Rights Movement by Katheryn Russell-Brown

Told through twelve short biographies, this book celebrates some of the many Black women who were instrumental to the nation's fight for civil rights.




Because of you, John Lewis : the true story of a remarkable friendship by Andrea Davis Pinkney


I have a dream : the life and words of Martin Luther King, Jr. by James Haskins

Presents the life, words, and principles of the noted civil rights worker through extensive quotations from his speeches and writings.




Rollin' on down the line : Lady Bird Johnson's 1964 whistle-stop tour for civil rights by Helen Kampion
